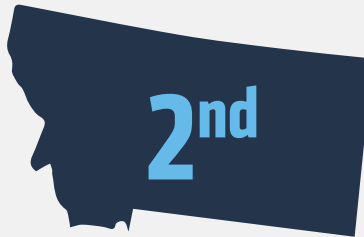

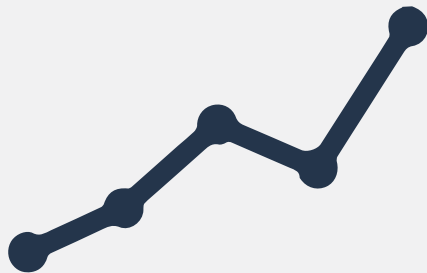

**JANUARY**

## ***Big Sky Sustainable Water Solutions Forum***



The Task Force began a collaborative, stakeholder-driven planning effort to ensure that the ecological health of the Gallatin and its tributaries are protected and enhanced as the Big Sky community grows.

**MARCH**

## ***Yellowstone Club Wastewater Effluent Spill***

We were a partner in the effort to plan, collect, and assess data to understand the impacts of a treated wastewater effluent spill in the South Fork of the West Fork of the Gallatin River on water quality and aquatic life.

## ***Hooked on the Gallatin: Youth Fly Fishing Camp***

The Gallatin River Fly Fishing Festival is a fun-filled event hosted by the Task Force to celebrate fly fishing and conservation in the Upper Gallatin. Leading up to the festival, we organized our first youth fly fishing camp to inspire a lifelong passion for fly fishing and river conservation for camp participants.



**AUGUST**

## ***Big Sky Water Conservation Program***

We began one of only two municipal water conservation programs in the state of Montana. Water conservation will be critical to ensure future drinking water supply and streamflows in the Gallatin.

## ***Continuing Education Class for Big Sky Realtors***

We developed and hosted a class to empower realtors with water resource information relevant to the Big Sky area to help new landowners make wise land use decisions that conserve land and protect water.

## ***West Fork Stream Restoration Project***

The Task Force broke ground on a large-scale stream restoration project on the West Fork of the Gallatin as it flows through the Big Sky Golf Course. The project will improve water quality, streamside vegetation, and fish habitat in the West Fork.





# WATERSHED MONITORING

Evaluating the health of the Upper Gallatin River has always been at the heart of what we do. We were founded in 2000 by a group of concerned community members with a simple goal: to understand baseline water quality in the Upper Gallatin River.

Today, the Task Force continues to work with citizen scientists to monitor the vital signs of our River. For the past sixteen years, intrepid volunteers have braved cold, high water, and blazing sun to build a record of chemical and physical indicators of watershed health. This year, we compiled sixteen years of data in a report summarizing the seasonal, spatial, and long-term trends measured since the inception of the watershed monitoring program.



In addition to collecting quarterly watershed data, the Task Force executes focused monitoring efforts to evaluate events or determine the successes and failures of our conservation work. The Task Force was intimately involved with the effort to understand the short and long term effects of the wastewater effluent spill at the Yellowstone Club in Big Sky in March 2016. We worked with private and state partners to measure the impacts of the spill on water quality, aquatic life, and aquatic habitat.

Long-term water quality data collected by our volunteers provided a critical framework to put the event in perspective. In addition, our continuous data allowed water managers to pinpoint the start and duration of the event.

Thank you to the many river lovers who have devoted countless hours to monitoring the health of the Gallatin River Watershed.

# CONSERVATION

The sixteen years of watershed data collected by the Task Force informs the planning and monitoring of projects developed to protect and restore the Gallatin River, its tributaries, streamside areas, and wetlands.

Thanks to strong community partnerships, the Task Force greatly expanded our conservation projects in 2016. These projects will undoubtedly leave long-lasting impacts on the health of our River.

Over 2016, we brought together a diverse group of stakeholders to plan for Big Sky's water future. The outcome from this effort will have great influence on the Big Sky community and our visitors, and the downstream communities in the Gallatin and Madison Valleys.



In September, we initiated the Big Sky Water Conservation Program to help ensure plentiful water in the Gallatin and Madison Watersheds. Fresh, clean water is a limited resource and the amount of water each of us uses every day impacts our neighbors, local fisheries and wildlife, and downstream users. We aim to reduce current water use and plan for more efficient future use by incentivizing and awarding our community's participation in efforts that prioritize water conservation.

After years of planning, we broke ground on a stream restoration project in October that will improve water quality, streamside vegetation, and fish habitat on the West Fork of the Gallatin River along the Big Sky Golf Course. Our successes were the result of a real team effort and we are deeply grateful for the overwhelming support.

# EDUCATION & OUTREACH

We believe that an engaged community is the foundation for a healthy watershed. Thanks to your support, our Education and Outreach Program grew by leaps and bounds in 2016.

For years, the Task Force has partnered with Ophir Elementary educators to inspire the next generation of conservation leaders. Our education programs include raising trout from egg to fingerling in the classroom and monitoring water quality in nearby rivers and streams.

In 2016, we expanded our watershed awareness programs for professionals in the Big Sky community. The Task Force hosted a series of workshops that armed construction industry professionals with the tools to minimize storm water runoff during construction in May. After completing the workshop series, participants were certified to perform storm water management inspections on construction sites.

The Task Force developed and hosted a continuing education course for Big Sky realtors in September that focused on land and water conservation. Thanks to rave reviews and support from local realtors, we will host the same course in Bozeman in spring 2017.

In October, the Task Force and Montana State University’s Water Center hosted a two-day workshop for water resource professionals that highlighted our conservation work on the West Fork. The course included a day of lecture focused on permitting and a day of willow identification and harvesting in the field. The harvested willows were planted along the streambanks of the West Fork to improve water quality.

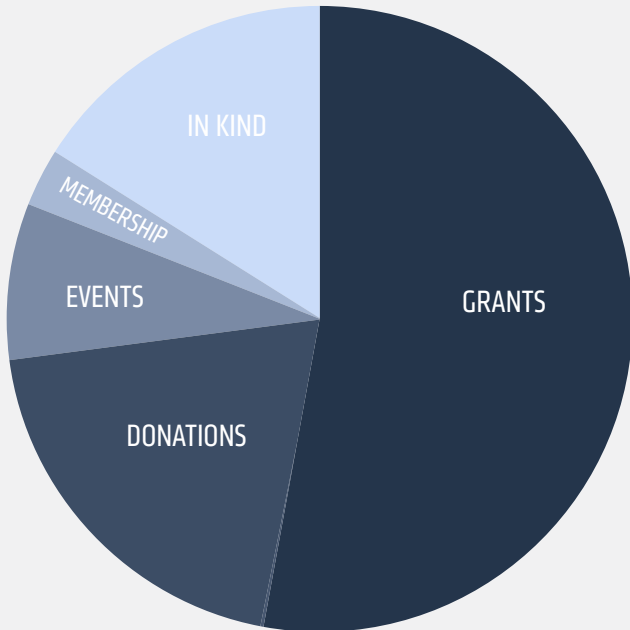

## INCOME 2016

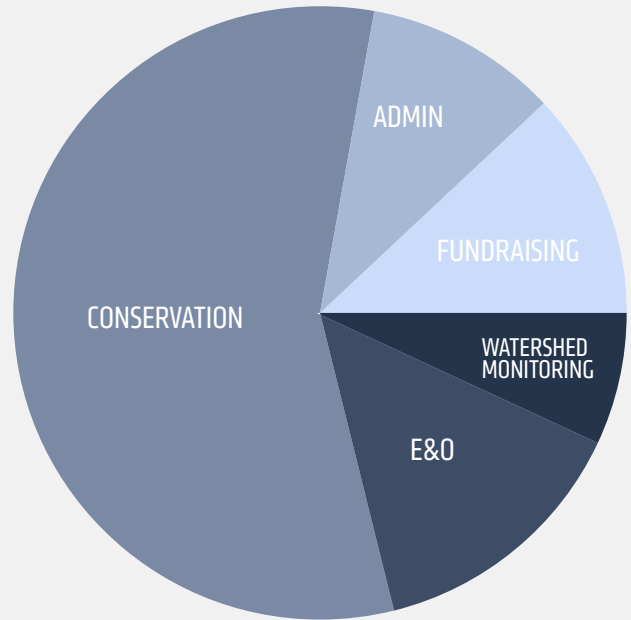

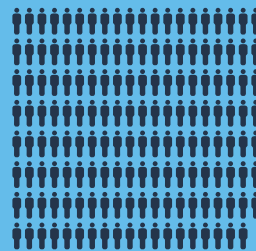
